Profusely illustrated, it constitutes a mine of information on all subjects concerning Central and South America, with articles on politics, economics, finances, culture, etc. The prospectus and specimen numbers are both present, as are special supplements on Venezuela, Uruguay,

This popular atlas, originally published in French in 1802., was translated into several languages and went through many editions. The author is best remembered for following Napoleon into exile at St. Helena and recording his memoirs. The atlas contains a most attractive map of America, along with colored American flags, and historical sketches of each country. The Mexican section has brief notice of the Mina expedition that launched from Texas. Similar in format to the Carey & Lea atlas.

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Third and best edition, with 37 added maps, including the two maps of America dated 1776 showing the theatres of war, making this one of the earliest European atlases to contain maps of the American Revolution. The atlas contains 11 handsome maps of American interest, including the 1762 issue of Janvier's L'Amérique Septentrionale" (Wheat 192 lists only the 1782 issue). Of Southwest interest are Bonne's "Carte du Mexique ou de la Nible. Espagne Contenant aussi le Nouveau Mexique, la Californie [Louisiana, and Florida]," Rizzi Zannoni's "Carte Geo-Hydrographique du Golfe du Mexique et de ses Isles" (including Texas coast), and the second part of the American Revolution map, which shows the Texas coast to Florida.

In response to recurring Indian depredations and increase of cattle rustling on the Texas-Mexican border, a Mexican commission was formed to investigate charges by the U.S. that the crimes were committed by Mexicans and Indians. This report, which the Mexican government ordered printed in English translation, absolves Mexicans of wrongdoing and accuses the U.S. of connivance. The little-known large map of the Rio Grande from its mouth to the Big Bend region is one of the most important and detailed of the period, showing each state along the border, towns, rivers, mountains, roads, forts, lakes, and every Mexican and American ranch. A respected Southwestern scholar who examined this copy at length commented that for its period it was comparable in importance to the Pichardo treatise for the colonial period of Texas history.

This original map, which has never been in any archival collection and bears no signatures, stamps, or registry identification, is illustrated in this catalogue (frontispiece) and on page 105 of Santos' Aguayo Expedition in Texas 1721. This is the original map, in all probability drafted by Aguayo himself, and previously it has been known only from the slightly different version in the Archivo General de la Nacion de Mexico (Vol. 236 Ramo Provincias Internas). The copy in Mexico, which is smaller in format and on cotton paper with tape stains and a tear across the bend of the San Antonio River, is illustrated in Bolton's Texas in the Middle Eighteenth Century and Repts' Cities of the American West (Fig. 3.5). It appears that this map was among the several maps of Texas that Brigadier Pedro de Rivera reportedly lost before submitting his report and Aguayo's presidial plates to the Archivo de Indias. This outstanding map was drawn in 1722 in conjunction with Aguayo's expedition to Texas in 1721-22 (see Handbook of Texas I:117). This expedition was the cementing factor in assuring Spanish possession of Texas, and more than anyone else, the Marquis established Spanish rule through his shrewd and logical disposition of the troops, establishment of presidios and missions, and recommendation of the establishment of civil government in Texas. His town plan, as illustrated in this historic map showing the proposed municipality of San Antonio de Casafuerte and environs to be settled by Canary Islanders, would fulfill all of Aguayo's expectations in developing into the City of San Antonio.

This handsome map by one of the most important Spanish geographers of the 18th century is the second printed map to apply the name "Texas" to a geographical region. The first printed map with that distinction was by the same cartographer and pre-dates the present map by only one year. For an illustration of Alzate y Ramirez's 1768 map, see Martin and Martin, Maps of Texas 20 and Wheat 149. Because the 1768 map is of the greatest rarity, the present map is probably the first obtainable map to use the name "Texas." This 1769 map extends the Gulf Coast to the vicinity of Pensacola, while the earlier map shows the Coast only as far east as the Sabine River. Wheat (Vol. 1, p. 134) discusses the sources of Humboldt's famous 1811 map of New Spain and specifically cites Alzate y Ramirez as one of his major sources, indicating the importance of this cartographer's work. This great map is the most important printed Spanish depiction of the U.S. Gulf Coast of the 18th century, and the first printed map showing major parts of the Spanish Southwest to be produced in Mexico.
